



### **Notable Alumni**



Dr. Amy Nopper received her medical degree from the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine. She initially completed a Pediatric Residency at Arkansas Children' Hospital, followed by a Pediatric Dermatology Research Fellowship at Stanford University before completing her Dermatology Residency at Medical College of Wisconsin. She graduated from the residency program in 1997, and subsequently completed an additional several months of pediatric dermatology clinical fellowship with Dr. Nancy Esterly at MCW.

Upon completion of training, Dr. Nopper returned to Kansas City and become the first Pediatric Dermatologist at Children's Mercy Hospital (CMH). As the Division Director since 1997, she has enjoyed the opportunity to develop the division into one of the largest academic programs in the country with five physicians and six advanced practice providers. She is also the cofounder of the CMH Vascular Anomalies Specialty Clinic for which she is the medical director. Dr. Nopper started the Pediatric Dermatology Fellowship at CMH in 1999 and served as the fellowship director until 2012. Currently, Dr. Nopper is a Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine and has had the opportunity to mentor and train many medical students, pediatric and dermatology residents, and pediatric dermatology fellows.

Dr. Nopper's clinical and research interests include infantile hemangiomas, vascular malformations, severe cutaneous adverse drug reactions, complex pediatric dermatology, and advocacy for children with visible skin disorders. She is a founding and current member of the Hemangioma Investigator Group and enjoys the camaraderie and inspiration of this group, as well as the opportunity to participate in multicenter clinical investigations. She has published widely, and her leadership service includes past Vice President of the Society of Pediatric Dermatology and participation in the Section of Dermatology within the AAP. Dr. Nopper has lectured extensively at the local, regional, national, and international level and has enjoyed participating in numerous Dermatology and Pediatric Board Review Courses over the past 25 years.

The highlight of Dr. Nopper's career, thus far, has been her clinical work and patient care. She particularly values the relationships she has developed with her pediatric dermatology colleagues, as well as with her many patients and their families, who continue to teach and inspire her.

### **Notable Alumni**



Dr. Juliet (Gunkel) Aylward completed her medical degree at the University of Wisconsin-Madison after earning a bachelor's degree in art history and a master's degree in business at the same institution. She completed her residency in dermatology at the Medical College of Wisconsin in 2004, followed by a Mohs surgery fellowship at Tufts-New England Medical Center in Boston. She is now a clinical professor of dermatology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison where she has been for nearly 20 years. During that time, she trained 16 Mohs surgery fellows, including MCW's Mohs surgery and fellowship director Dr Julia Kasprzak, directed the Mohs fellowship for 8 years, and served as chief of Mohs surgery for 12 years.

Her clinical and research interests are focused on patient outcomes and high-risk skin cancer treatment. Her commitment to improving the quality and accessibility of skin cancer care drives these research efforts. She also is dedicated to promoting the history and legacy of Dr Frederic Mohs, a

pioneer in skin cancer treatment. Through her successful fundraising efforts, endowments for research and clinical faculty honoring Dr Mohs have been established. She also has partnered with the UW Archives and researchers to create an oral history project about Dr Mohs, produce a documentary about his life and work, and preserve and catalog his papers and extensive clinical photographs and films.

#### Dr. Wilson's Retirement

Long-time and beloved faculty member, Dr. Barbara Wilson, retired in June 2024 after 21 years of service to the MCW Department of Dermatology. Dr. Wilson joined the department in 1993 as a part-time volunteer faculty member. In 2007, she was recruited from private practice in the Milwaukee community to join the full-time faculty and become Program Director of the residency program, a position she held until 2015. During her tenure at MCW, she was also Medical Director of the Froedtert Dermatology Clinic from 2012–2018 amongst many other leadership roles. Dr. Wilson was the consummate physician and teacher, mentoring countless residents and students to successful careers.

In honor of a career dedicated to teaching, the Barbara Wilson Teaching Award was created and awarded to Dr. Wilson as the inaugural recipient. She was presented with the award by the 2024 graduating class at resident graduation.

## **Dermatology Research**

The Department of Dermatology continues to grow in the realm of research with innovative clinical trials, student led projects, quality of care studies, and translational research. In July we welcomed a new research fellow: Alexa Ries (pre-doctoral fellow, The University of Utah) to our research team, bringing our group to a total of a research program manager, two clinical research coordinators, a clinical research assistant, and two research fellows. We would like to highlight a few of our studies this past year below:

#### **Clinical Trials in Inflammatory Skin Disease**

New emerging medications with unique mechanisms of action have made for exciting times in Dermatology. New targeted therapies for diseases previously lacking FDA-approved medications or with large treatment gaps provide hope for our patients. Both the adult and pediatric clinical trials work continues to expand and provide access to new treatments with focus on inflammatory skin conditions such as atopic dermatitis, psoriasis, and hidradenitis suppurativa.

# "Transition of Care" - Bridging the Gap: Study of the Transition from Pediatric to Adult Dermatology Care (Yvonne Chiu, MD / Alexa Ries)

Health-related quality of life (HRQoL) measures are important in assessing the burden of illness and outcomes of medical treatment. The literature is limited in assessments of adolescent and young adults (AYA) and their transition readiness in dermatological care. Deficits in health-specific self-management skills, a critical transition readiness indicator, have been linked to poorer health outcomes. This association is particularly concerning for adolescents with chronic health conditions, who demonstrate lower transition readiness compared to the general population. A lack of transition of care interventions is shown to have poor outcomes, including deterioration in health, increased medication complications and poor adherence, discontinuity in care, and higher healthcare costs.

The goal of this study is to assess transition readiness among adolescent and young adults (AYA) who will undergo or have undergone transition of care from a pediatric to adult dermatologist.

## Quality of Life in melanoma patients (Kara Young, MD / Nicole Boswell, MD)

Few studies have been conducted regarding quality-of-life outcomes in melanoma, especially studies comparing time since diagnosis, staging, location, and treatments. While there is some reported information regarding race and socioeconomic status and survival in melanoma, there is not reported data comparing race and socioeconomic status on the quality of life in melanoma patients in the current medical literature. The primary objective of this study is to characterize quality of life of patients with melanoma followed at the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) Dermatology clinic. In order to further characterize quality of life in patients with melanoma, a Functional Assessment of Cancer Therapy- Melanoma (FACT-M) will be given at a standard of care dermatology visit for patients with a history of melanoma seen for a skin-check. The need to conduct more research regarding these factors is necessary to advance medical knowledge and improve outcomes for these patients.
