he Medical College of Wisconsin's education mission is dedicated to preparing tomorrow's health professionals and scientists to become leaders in their communities, across the country and around the world through a continued quest for knowledge and growth. Together with our innovative approach to academic medicine, this has not only prepared our students to excel in their fields, but also has instilled a responsibility to administer compassionate, equitable and culturally competent care. With each passing year, MCW's faculty, staff and students continue to demonstrate inspiring new approaches to learning and the importance of promoting service to our community.

MCW's School of Graduate Studies recorded an all-time high for applications in the 2023-2024 academic year, with over 750 applications processed and submitted. In May, the School welcomed its new Dean, Daisy Sahoo, PhD, and "Toast Tuesday" became a well-loved point of meaningful connection between School of Graduate Studies students, faculty and staff. MCW's School of Pharmacy partnered with RPRD Diagnostics to give first-year pharmacy students the opportunity to engage in personalized

pharmacogenomics testing. This experience will assist future pharmacists with exploring how their patients' genes respond to and tolerate certain medications. In July 2024, the School of Medicine's Milwaukee campus successfully launched the Health Equity Scholars Program (HESP), a health equity training track aimed at addressing health and health care disparities in Wisconsin. MCW-Green Bay's student organization, Med Thread, fostered connections with local cancer patients through the creation and donation of hand-made blankets. At MCW-Central Wisconsin, the recently launched Rural Health Equity Scholars Program aims to educate students about the impacts of racism and other barriers to health equity faced by both rural Hispanic and Non-Hispanic communities in Central Wisconsin.

MCW remains a distinguished leader and innovator in the education and development of the next generation of physicians, scientists, pharmacists and health professionals. We continue to embrace the responsibility of ensuring all MCW learners are equipped with the skills to adapt to the everchanging landscape of medical discovery and patient care, while making a difference in the communities they will serve.

The MCW Office of Student Health and Wellness, in partnership with the MCW Wellness Program, hosted two successful Clothing Swap events during the 2023-2024 academic year. During each event, MCW faculty, staff and students gathered to exchange used clothing in an effort to promote sustainable consumption. By swapping, participants acquired additional clothing without incurring additional costs. During the 2023 Fall Clothing Swap, 425 clothing items were collected and 327 items found new homes. Throughout the 2024 Spring Clothing Swap, 649 items were collected and 436 items were taken. Following each event, unclaimed items were donated to a local agency. Due to its resounding success, the Clothing Swap event has already been planned for the 2024-2025 academic year!





The Office of Student Health and Wellness also partnered with the MCW Wellness Program and Student & Resident Behavioral Health to hold an event in September commemorating Suicide Prevention Awareness Week, while also partnering with current MCW-Milwaukee M3 student, Anna Burneske, to hold monthly yoga classes for students. SUPPORTING OUR LEARNERS AND FACULTY

The Department of Academic Affairs hosted the 11th annual Innovations in Healthcare Education Research (IHER) Conference Sept. 17-19, which offered in-person and virtual participation options and brought together participants from 31 states and nine countries. The Conference featured faculty, staff and students who are passionate about discovering new approaches to assessing learning, faculty development, curricular design and teaching delivery methods that enhance the student learning experience and prepare students for a career in healthcare.

The IHER Conference has grown over time, with 320 participants in 2024. This was the third year with an international presence, as the Conference welcomed colleagues from Australia, Bahamas, Canada, Israel, Netherlands, Norway, Puerto Rico, Sweden and United Kingdom.



SCHOOL OF GRADUATE STUDIES

MCW's School of Graduate Studies (SOGS) has had a whirlwind of a year! The School currently houses 42 programs ranging from doctoral to certificate programs. For the 2023-2024 school year, the SOGS welcomed 64 new PhD students, 12 new DrPH students, and 50 new master's students. They also had an all-time high for applications, with over 750 applications processed and submitted. In addition to these encouraging new admissions numbers, they also celebrated the first DrPH class during the Spring 2024 Commencement along with 104 graduating students! The School is excited to see all that these graduates will achieve in the years to come!

The School of Graduate Studies has also started a new tradition known as "Toast Tuesday." Every other Tuesday, students are invited to come into the SOGS office

and enjoy some toast and a cup of coffee with the School of Graduate Studies team! All graduate students are welcome, and it is a wonderful opportunity for students to interact with staff and faculty in the Graduate School.

In February 2024, the School welcomed its new Dean, Dr. Daisy Sahoo, who succeeded the previous Dean, Dr. Ravi Misra, who has since taken a new position as an Associate Provost here at MCW. Dr. Sahoo is a Professor in the Department of Medicine and she has been a member of the MCW community since 2007. She also holds secondary appointments in Biochemistry and Pharmacology & Toxicology. Dr. Sahoo was installed as the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies on May 6, and staff, faculty, and students were in attendance to celebrate this incredible milestone.



MCW School of Pharmacy Leads Innovation Through Pharmacogenomics Testing

When a medication isn't working for a patient, pharmacists and physicians can adjust the dosage or find alternatives – yet this takes time, additional office visits and wasted medications. Pharmacogenomics testing, however, allows prescribing decisions to be made preemptively instead of relying on trial and error.

Since its founding in 2017, the MCW School of Pharmacy has embraced the field of pharmacogenomics. First-year pharmacy students have the rare opportunity to engage in personalized pharmacogenomics testing thanks to a partnership with RPRD Diagnostics. They complete a buccal sample by swabbing the insides of their cheeks. Weeks later, after learning the foundational concepts required to interpret their results, students then explore how their genes may affect their respective responses to certain medications. **READ MORE>>**

MCW-Green Bay Students Provide Comfort and Compassion to Local Cancer Patients

At MCW-Green Bay, the student organization known as Med Thread blends a passion for oncology with the craft of crocheting. Founded by MCW-GB Class of 2026 students Chandler Krajco, Brandon Harrison, Sarah Vorderbruggen, Mingee Kim, Abigail Swenson and Chantilly Yakes, this group donates handmade



blankets to cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy at Bellin's Infusion Center. Each blanket is given to a patient receiving chemotherapy and is theirs to keep, often becoming a source of comfort they bring with them through the end of their treatment.

For medical students, involvement in Med Thread offers an important reminder of the human side of medicine. M3 student, Elizabeth Martin, shared, "It has been a wonderful experience to be a part of a group that chooses to spend their spare time (which can be hard to come by as a medical student!) to create something for others. Central Wisconsin Campus

Over the past year, students from MCW-Central Wisconsin have participated in the newly established Rural Health Equity Scholars Program, funded by the Advancing a Healthier Wisconsin Endowment. This program aims to educate participants about the impacts of racism and other barriers to health equity faced by both rural Hispanic and Non-Hispanic communities in Central Wisconsin through hands-on experience with community health workers, health navigators and physicians from the Wausau Free Clinic.

As part of this initiative, medical students are helping community members understand the significance of preventive care in the detection and management of chronic diseases such as hypertension and diabetes, and other topics selected by the community. Students have



engaged with Hispanic and Hmong community health workers at inclusive health and resource events held in community centers, churches and farms. Services they offer include administering influenza vaccinations at pop-up clinics, conducting blood pressure and diabetes screenings and providing Stop the Bleed training.

These initiatives, along with other community projects, continue to positively impact the lives of residents living in Central Wisconsin.

MCW Scholarly Concentrations (formerly Scholarly Pathways) Program

Beginning July 1, 2024, MCW's Scholarly Pathways program became known as Scholarly Concentrations. Academic year 2023-2024 marked the year of programming success for Pathways, thanks in large part to our invested faculty. Program evaluation is an ongoing endeavor, but this spring, the Office of Student Scholarly Activities (OSSA) invested heavily in reassessing our outcomes and future directions. After compiling past evaluation data, they hosted five student focus groups and a Pathways Leadership Retreat, crafted a refreshed MISSION STATEMENT, and determined that the program would best support medical students with nomenclature that matched national trends. To that

Medical Student Summer Research Program

The Summer Academic program for Medical Students (SAMS) and the Medical Student Summer Research Program (MSSRP) offer opportunities that are designed to expose medical students to cutting-edge basic science, clinical or translational research, as well as scholarships in education, global health and quality improvement.



Students are integrated into the scholarly work of full-time Medical College of Wisconsin faculty investigators and gain valuable experience as a member of a team, working on some aspect of the faculty member's study.

The training is designed to help medical students acquire greater understanding of and appreciation for the tools and methodologies that support healthcare innovation and to visualize themselves in the physician-scientist role.

Match Day took place on Friday, March 15, 2024, and marked the culmination of four years of MCW medical students' preparation throughout their educational experience. MCW's 99% cumulative match rate for 2024 far exceeded the NATIONAL MATCH RATE OF 92-95%. This day follows a year's work for MCW students applying to residency programs in the specialty of their choice, traveling for interviews and submitting a ranking of their preferred programs to find out where they will go for the next phase of their career. Guests and a select number of MCW faculty and staff celebrated Match Day in person at Milwaukee's GATHER at Deer District. Additionally, a VIRTUAL CONGRATS VIDEO, consisting of photos submitted by graduating medical students, was shared with the entire MCW community.


Highlights from the 2024 Match

Through the 2024 Match, **235** MCW medical students obtained first-year residency positions. A total of **88** students remained in Wisconsin for PGY1 residency training – **38%** of MCW-Milwaukee students, **40%** of MCW-Central Wisconsin students and **30%** of MCW-Green Bay students. The greatest percentage of specialties represented through the 2024 Match were in internal medicine, family medicine, surgery-general, anesthesiology, and (pediatrics and psychiatry tied for fifth).



On His Way to the CDC: MCW Researcher Becomes the Role Model He Never Had



rowing up in the 90s, Joe Rouse, PhD '24, a recent graduate of the Microbiology and Immunology program at the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW), says that, as a gay man, he struggled to find role models with whom he could identify.

"I was always looking for a gay or queer idol to look up to, but of course there never were any that were visible to me," Dr. Rouse says. "They weren't really showing that to us back then."

The researcher and Army veteran is working to change that.

"Since I didn't have a role model when I was going through the education system, I now try to be as visible as possible so other people can see someone like themselves," he says. "It is important to let others know that someone who has dealt with the same thing they're dealing with could make it through."

Dr. Rouse has done more than just make it through, he's excelling. He recently secured a postdoctoral research fellowship with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), where he'll focus on the development and improvement of the influenza vaccine.




dileen Sii remembers being a grade schooler accompanying her grandmas to doctor's visits to translate for them. "My grandma depended on my 10-year-old

self to accurately relay her story because others did not understand her," says Sii, whose parents and grandmothers immigrated to the United States from Sibu, Malaysia. "Not having a strong command of either of my languages, I was nervous, but did the best I could."

"My mission is to advance health equity," says Papadimitriou, a thirdyear medical student at the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) who plans to focus on emergency medicine. "It's my passion, my purpose, my why."

That passion has taken her across the globe, from her home in Montréal, Canada, to Puerto Rico, Peru and Ecuador, to New York City and now Milwaukee. Originally interested in global health, her experiences as a Master of Public Health student working for the New York City Department of Health during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic and now as a medical student



in Milwaukee have taught her that health care challenges she witnessed abroad are also prevalent in the US.

"I realized that a lot of health disparities I saw in low-income countries in the Global South also exist here right in our backyard," Papadimitriou saus. "Milwaukee is like a perfect laboratory for that." READ MORE>>



MCW Pharmacy Students Advocate for Pharmacy Policy Efforts at State Capitol

tudents from the MCW School of Pharmacy joined a group of more than 280 pharmacists, pharmacy technicians and pharmacy students who participated in the Pharmacy Society of Wisconsin (PSW) 2024 Legislative Day. The annual event includes an educational session to learn about Wisconsin pharmacy policy efforts, plus tips for meeting with legislators and staffers.

"What I learned from Legislative Day was the importance of advocating for our profession so that we can create equitable access to healthcare for patients," said first-year pharmacy student Rickie Yang.

Students gained advocacy experience, meeting in small groups with their respective senators and state

representatives to promote three pieces of legislation. One bill, which has passed in the Assembly but has not gone to the Senate floor, would expand access to oral and patch contraceptives by allowing pharmacists to independently prescribe these products. A second bill looks to reform polices surrounding pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs). Students encouraged legislators to bring the bill back next session, as it has only reached the public hearing stage in both houses. The final bill, which has passed in the Assembly but only reached the introductory phase in the Senate, proposes eliminating the requirement for pharmacists to take a law exam for licensure.


"Typical health challenges that many encounter can include not being able to find a secure job that pays you well enough to seek medical attention and not being able to obtain health insurance," Perez says.

Those realities hit hard when Perez was 10 years old and his grandmother was diagnosed with breast cancer, and then again a few years later when his grandfather required open heart surgery. But being exposed to those challenges



also piqued Perez's interest in the field of medicine.

"I just got curious and at some point, decided maybe this is something that interests me and that I would pursue further," he says. **READ MORE>>**



Saturday Clinic for the Uninsured Achieves Gold Seal of Excellence

n November 2023, the Wisconsin Association of Free & Charitable Clinics (WAFCC) awarded the MCW-affiliated Saturday Clinic for the Uninsured (SCU) the Gold Seal of Excellence. The determination is made based on achievement of the WAFCC Standards of Excellence, which are measurable guidelines that aid clinics in providing quality care and optimizing accessibility.

MCW's medical and pharmacy students run the clinic under faculty supervision, utilizing an interprofessional model of care delivery that strives to understand, serve and promote the health and wellness needs of uninsured patients in Milwaukee while simultaneously educating future healthcare professionals.

In addition to MCW's students and faculty, an intertwining network of partnerships make SCU possible: donors provide funding; volunteer physicians and pharmacists such give their time and expertise; organizations such as the Milwaukee Free and Community Clinic Collaborative increase medication access; the Milwaukee Health Department supplies vaccines; and Ascension Columbia St. Mary's provides laboratory services and the clinic space at its Family Health Center. **READ MORE>>**

Balson, who graduates in May, helped create a peer support program for fellow medical students at MCW.

The program, Seeking Peer Outreach, is a student-led approach to addressing mental health among medical students, including issues such as stigma, isolation, depression and suicide risk.


"We worked super hard to create an open, welcoming environment on campus where people felt like they could share their mental health struggles," Balson says.

general population and face additional stigmas that may decrease their willingness to seek support for wellbeing.

Balson and fellow MCW student Justin York began working as first-year medical students with Margaret Lieb, who started the program on the MCW-Central Wisconsin campus in Wausau and has since moved on to pursue her plastic surgery residency training at Southern Illinois University. In York and Balson's second year at MCW, they became student leads, overseeing the program as the pilot was completed and implementation began.


